Would you wear a T-shirt mocking the Japanese Americans whom the U.S. Government put in internment camps during WWII? Or Indigenous people who starved in U.S. internment camps that eventually became reservations? Would you wear a baseball cap showing Nazis yukking it up in concentration camps?

We hope you wouldn't.

Twenty years from now, most people will look at “Alligator Alcatraz” merchandise in the same way. Built on sacred land stolen from the Miccosukee and Seminole Nations, this detention center is a concentration camp for immigrants, many of whom have committed no crime, who have followed the rules by reporting faithfully to immigration courts, where ICE has kidnapped them.

A Venezuelan detainee reported to CBS News:

“They have us in a cage like chickens. There are 32 people in each cage. We have no rights here. When we need something, they ignore us.”

The wife of a Cuban detainee reported on conditions in the camp to the Associated Press.

“They have no way to bathe, no way to wash their mouths, the toilet overflows and the floor is flooded with pee and poop. They eat once a day and have two minutes to eat. The meals have worms.”

Alligator Alcatraz violates the U.S. Constitution and international humanitarian law.
